Background

The General Plan Visioning and Guiding Principles were developed from community feedback received at workshops held in June and July 2024. The initial draft was presented to the Board of Supervisors and the Planning Commission at a joint workshop held on October 15, 2024. After receiving feedback from the Board and Commission, staff revised the visioning and guiding principles and presented the changes to the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) on December 30, 2024.

On January 15, 2025, at a regular meeting of the Planning Commission, a special meeting was set for March 5, 2025, to discuss the proposed draft visioning and guiding principles.

For the March 5, 2025, special meeting, staff has created two versions of the draft visioning and guiding principles for consideration and possible approval by the Planning Commission.

Comments

A Notice of Public Hearing was published in the Siskiyou Daily News on February 12, 2025. One public comment was received from the Mount Shasta Bioregional Ecology Center which expressed support for the county's ongoing efforts to update the General Plan.

Environmental Review

The General Plan Visioning and Guiding Principles recommendation is exempt from environmental review pursuant to Section 15061(b)(3) of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines under the general rule that CEQA only applies to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment. Because it can be seen with certainty that there is no potential for the proposed recommendation to have a significant effect on the environment, staff is recommending the "common sense exemption" be adopted in accordance with Section 15061(b)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines.

Planning Staff Recommendations

Option 1:

- 1. Recommend the Board of Supervisors approve the draft Visioning and Guiding Principles (Attachment 1) as amended by the Planning Commission on March 5, 2025; and
- 2. Recommend the Board of Supervisors determine the project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) in accordance with Section 15061(b)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines.

• Option 2:

- 1. Recommend the Board of Supervisors approve the draft Visioning and Guiding Principles (Attachment 2), which incorporates recommended changes requested by the Karuk Tribe, as amended by the Planning Commission on March 5, 2025; and
- 2. Recommend the Board of Supervisors determine the project exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) in accordance with Section 15061(b)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines.
